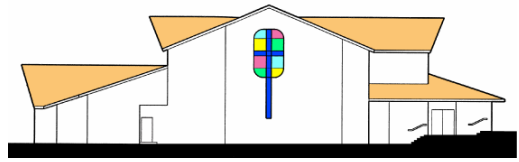

Building To TOUCH Lives

Important Building Milestone Reached

This month marked a huge milestone for the progress of the new building. The concrete floor was poured on Tuesday, August 16. The process, which began at 5:30 a.m., took nearly fourteen hours to complete. A nine-person crew was on hand as well as construction site manager Gregg Louvier and building team member John Davis. Sixteen cement trucks delivered the concrete throughout the morning. Gregg is pleased with how well the job was completed. "It is difficult to get that large of an area so flat, and Desi's crew did a great job."

The pouring of the slab marks the end of a two-and-a-half month-long project which involved careful planning and placement of plumbing lines and electrical conduits.

The next step is to frame the walls. Before this work begins however, finishing the garage will be the priority.

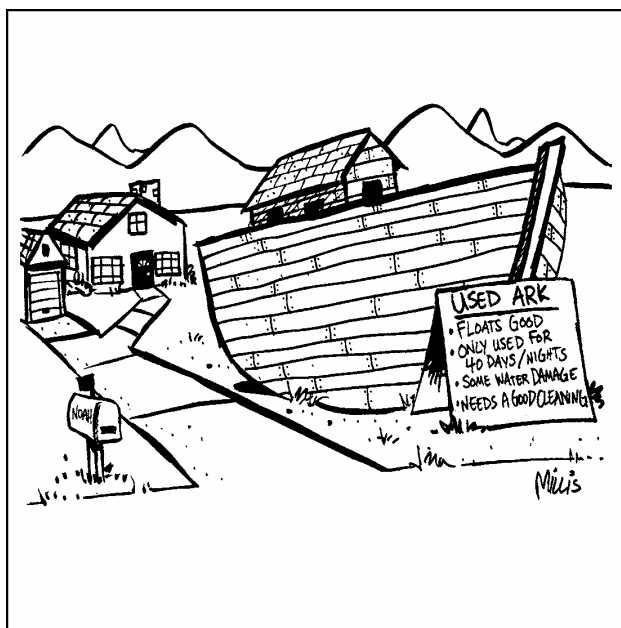

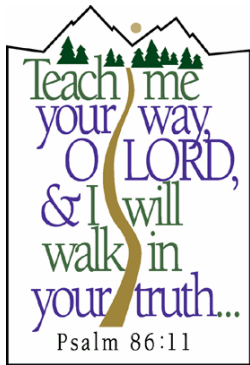

The Psalms: Expressing Ourselves God's Way!



School is beginning and Fall is on its way so it must be time to turn our thoughts to Women's Sunday School class. By unanimous vote of the class ending last June, we will be focusing this year upon the book of Psalms. Some of the many topics we will address include:

- The nature, types, forms, and functions of the Psalms
- Frequent misunderstandings as to purpose of the Psalms
- How people innocently misuse the Psalms
- How the Psalms can be misapplied because of being misunderstood
- Appreciating and using the Psalms for personal quiet time and worship
- Who wrote the Psalms? Who are they written to? Who are they written about?

This class is designed for women 18 years and older and is led by Kathy Bledsoe who is entering her fourth year teaching adult Sunday school for Highline Christian Church. The class meets in the south end of the Fellowship Hall (library) every Sunday at 9:30 A.M. The format of the class is such that drop-ins can be assured of feeling comfortable and welcome to participate. By the same token, women who may have occasional other church responsibilities at the same time as class, will find that they have not lost the thread of instruction, information, or participation. We have an open door policy!

This year-long study of the Psalms will begin on September 18th. Ladies...you owe yourself the treat of delving more deeply into God's Word!

Who Started the Sunday School?

The concept of a Sunday school came from a Christian layman whose name was Robert Raikes. Mr. Raikes began to notice that many of the children of the working class in his city (Gloucester, England) were unable to read or write. It was almost impossible for them to go to school because they were expected to work in factories 16 hours a day, six days a week. He noticed, also, that on their day off, children had little to do but roam the streets.

Believing that education — particularly education about the teaching of the Bible and Christian doctrine — could make a difference in young lives, Raikes set out to help the needy children. To begin, he found four Christian women who could teach reading and writing with a particular emphasis on Christian themes. He paid them a small wage to gather and teach children in a private home. Surprisingly, some clergymen were disturbed that Bible lessons were being taught by un-ordained people. Fortunately, other clergymen saw the purpose and value of such teaching and encouraged it.

The Sunday school movement soon spread all across England. Mr. Raikes opened the first school in 1780. Eight years later, there were already more than 250,000 children enrolled in Sunday schools. Today, almost every church in the world has opportunities for Christian education.
